Let's Help the Groomers

Remember when you're out on the trail:

- Groomers may be on the trail anytime of the day or night.
- When meeting a groomer head-on, have patience. The operator may not see you right away.
- When you drive up behind a groomer, get as far to the right as possible, or if you can, off the trail.
- Groomers travel slower than snowmobiles.
- Groomers take up all or most of the trail. If you have to cut away a downed tree, cut far enough back so the groomer can get through on the next pass.

Anytime and every time you have the opportunity, tell a groomer operator how great of a job they're doing. Many love to ride, just like you. They need to hear your appreciation if you truly enjoy riding smooth trails or simply having trails to ride on at all. The groomers are often the ones who help brush and sign the trails as well. They need as much help and appreciation as we can all give them.



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

What a different year this is from last year. Last year, we had a good amount of snow for a month by Thanksgiving; this year, most of us have little to no snow by the same time. I guess the one constant is that everything changes.

Those of us that have been around for many weather cycles remember when there were more than 70 manufacturers of snowmobiles. Now, with the announcement by Yamaha that they will no longer manufacture Yamaha snowmobiles, this leaves us with less than a handful of snowmobile manufacturers. It is also difficult to purchase new and used snow groomers. Ski hills and groomer operators are hanging on to their equipment longer because of the cost of new ones and the lack of new ones in their inventory; it's too expensive to have many new groomers sitting on their lots. The one encouraging news is that most of the groomer manufacturers are promising to start making 3/4 size groomers that are much cheaper, still with plenty of power and using less fuel due to new technology—more changes.

The one thing that doesn't change is the attack by the non-motorized groups that want to shut us out of our public lands. The Kootenai National Forest has proposed a rule to close higher elevations to snowmobile use on March 31 for Grizzly Bear protection; they will leave the lower elevations open. It doesn't do us much good, as I'm pretty sure the low snow melts out long before the upper elevations. I have been sledding for more than 40 years and can't remember a grizzly bear vs. snowmobile encounter.

The Lolo National is in full travel plan mode. So far, they have started with rivers and lakes, plant and animal species; the trails and roads will be coming soon. They seem to be following their standard operating plan of "closed unless designated open," listing almost everything closed and requiring us to comment and fight to justify why we think something should be open. BLM is revisiting land use plans; this has real potential to limit our ability to use BLM lands.

In 1973, my inaugural sled experience on a possible Ski-Doo in Canada left me cold and stranded on a lake near Calgary, courtesy of an unfortunate gas shortage. Fast forward to 2006, when my husband Ron rekindled my interest in sledding, turning it into a lifestyle.

While my passion for the sport took its time to flourish, I embraced it by acquiring my own sled in 2007. Although my initial ride was short-lived, I recently upgraded to a 2022 model, eagerly awaiting my next adventure. My dedication lies in supporting the sledding community rather than achieving mastery on the snow.

In 2016, I found my calling as the secretary of the MSA, ensuring enthusiasts stay informed about state-level events. The highlight was the partnership between the Trans-Montana Charity ride and NAMI (National Alliance for Mental Illness), aligning with my roles as a Licensed Clinical Professional Counselor and Mental Health Professional Person. NAMI's cause is close to my heart, and I contribute through my private practice in Lewistown and state contracts for mental health and addiction services.

From that initial sled ride in 1973, my journey has evolved into supporting NAMI, providing mental health and addiction services, disseminating information through MSA Board Meetings, and enjoying snow activities with my husband, MSA District 9 Representative. Life is fulfilling, thanks to MSA's role in fostering winter sports, education, safety, and fun for enthusiasts of all skill levels.



What's In Your Pack?

1. Avalanche Beacon/Transceiver. This is a must, no exceptions here in Montana. Get a current 3-antenna beacon.

2. Probe. If you don't have an avi-bag, carry a probe so you can assist in a search if needed.

3. Shovel: Metal with an extendable handle, preferably one that can be configured as a hoe for moving snow efficiently. If you only have one shovel, it should be on you–it does no good if it's on a buried sled.

4. Communication Device / Two-way Radio. This makes communicating (and finding your stuck buddy) so much easier. Educate yourself on FRS/GMRS signals, power, rules, and what channels actually transmit at higher power settings. You can also legally get and operate higher-power radios with a simple \$35 FCC license.

5. Avi-bag backpack. If you ride regularly in Avalancheprone areas, please consider getting and wearing an avibag. If you don't want/need a bag, please have a beacon, probe, and shovel.

6. GPS/Satellite Communication Device Some Apple iPhones and soon some Android phones will enable 911 calls via Satelite. However, Garmin, Zoleo, and others now offer great solutions at competitive prices.

7. Phone w/GPS Mapping App. Good idea to have a paper map and compass for backup.

8. Headlamp: make sure it can work with your helmet as a second light source. The strobe feature is nice as a signaling device.

9. Waterproof Matches and Firestarter. Starting a fire when you are cold or hypothermic is nearly impossible if you don't have the right stuff.

10. Extra Clothes: Gloves, dry layer like a poly puffy coat, socks and a wool hat.

11. Emergency Space Blanket Bag: I like the "bag" that you can slip a person into. Trying to keep a mylar blanket wrapped around a person is nearly impossible (esp in the wind). A true Bivy Sack is great too.

12. Spare batteries/Charger. Make sure they are charged/healthy. A small battery pack/charger is great to recharge your phone (keep it warmer in your pack or glovebox).

13. Cyalume Sticks. Backup for flashlight and great for night rescue situations.

14. Eye Drops. Riding an eye-down sucks.

15. Backcountry First Aid Kit with Quick Clot Dressing. A hemostatic dressing that will help stop bleeding. One sharp stick or piece of broken plastic can cause a bad day.

16. Protective Vest. If you can ride the tight trees, it's a good idea.

17. RECCO Rescue Reflector. Allows S&R to find you more easily if you ride in an area where they have/use the detectors (Flathead-Two Bear Air).

18. Toilet Paper. When ya gotta go, you'll be glad you brought it!

19. Chemical Hand or Body Warmers. The iron oxide kind. Useful to warm up a person awaiting rescue too, esp the larger size.



Looking for Recommendations? Mark's Shopping List

Here's an Amazon Shopping List with many of the items I carry or similar items to what I and others I ride with carry: (https://www.amazon.com/hz/wishlist/ls/FF65CZ8TM71O?ref_=wl_share) I've also found things like headlamps at Costco recently, so shop around! Harbor Freight has decent tools, siphons, etc. Don't scrimp on shovels and avalanche gear. Avy gear is personal-choose what fits you and your style. Same with your mapping app. We have a couple great Montana-based companies to choose from: Trail Treker and OnX are both Montana based! Avenza is another option (not US based). (Mark is a long-time avid rider and serves as Co-Chair of Trans-Montana.)

The great sport of snowmobiling is only possible due to the many great, behind-the-scenes volunteers who work tirelessly to create, maintain, and protect the places where we ride. Every year MSA recognizes volunteers who go above and beyond the call of duty. This year we've included a new nomination category for Youth Snowmobiler of the Year. Submit your nominations for that special person or club who strives to make the sport more enjoyable.

To submit a nomination for the MSA top honors, visit snowmobilemt.org to download the application forms. Nominations must be received by MSA no later than December 31. See entry form for details.

These prestigious awards will be presented at the MSA Annual Snowmobile Banquet in Butte this February. Event category-winning nominations will go on to further compete at the national level hosted by American Council of Snowmobile Associations (ASCA).

Trail Groomer Etiquette

If you come upon a groomer working on the trails and absolutely must use that route, try to minimize your impacts by observing the following groomer etiquette:

- Slow down!
- Try to stay off the fresh grooming if the trail or adjacent area is wide enough to safely and legally do so
- Operate only at the far outside edge of the fresh grooming if your only option is to ride upon the newly groomed trail
- Keep your group in single file versus allowing everyone to take a different path on the fresh grooming
- Don't be purposely disrespectful (and damaging) by intentionally fishtailing or powering through the soft snow

Respect the work trail groomer operators do by never following directly behind their grooming equipment, since it immediately destroys their work. If possible, try to avoid riding a snowmobile on freshly groomed trails for at least two hours after the groomer passes by either waiting or choosing an alternate route. Showing this respect can help improve the quality and durability, as well as the safety, of your snowmobile trails.

Grant Application Trail Grooming SCORP Benefits

In the past few years, funding for snowmobile trail grooming in the state of Montana has come under funding pressure. In an effort to support the groups applying for grant funding, we have sent every club a document that may be used in the funding narrative to support your local grooming efforts. One of the initiatives/sets of goals that state agencies are striving towards is the Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan or SCORP. SCORP set down six key initiatives. By defining how trail grooming helps meet the SCORP initiatives, your grant application may be scored more competitively and have a better chance at full funding.

By pointing out that you have SCORP in mind as you carry out your operation, you show those that oversee the programs that you are helping them achieve their goals as well by funding your operation. Contact Fred Bailey for more details on SCORP benefits.


Please remember that we can take donations to auction off as well at our banquet, so don't be afraid to collect those kinds of donations as well and bring them to Butte!

AVALANCHE SAFETY New Avalanche Forecast in Island Park, ID

The Gallatin National Forest Avalanche Center (GNFAC) is excited to announce that this year the mountains near Island Park, ID will have daily avalanche forecasts with avalanche Danger Ratings. This is exciting news for Montana riders, as Island Park is right on the Idaho-Montana border, less than a half hour drive south of West Yellowstone, MT (you can even ride between the two via a groomed trail network).

Snowmobile and snow bike use in the Centennial Mountain Range near Island Park area is growing. The need for more avalanche information was driven home in 2018 when there were two avalanche deaths only ten days apart when the GNFAC had issued avalanche warnings for the Lionhead area (only around 15 miles away).

These deaths galvanized the local riding community to reach out for help and the GNFAC began working to bring more avalanche awareness to the area. The following season the GNFAC began issuing avalanche warnings for the Island Park area and added a dedicated page to its website to collect and share observations specific to Island Park.

Expanding into a new forecast region is a big task and developing partnerships has been crucial to its success. GNFAC forecasters are visiting the area regularly to gather snowpack data.

Building relationships with local riders and guide services to get more field observation has been a huge help. An Avalanche Alliance grant funded two new remote weather stations (one measuring wind speed and one measuring snow depth). The Fugowee Snowmobile Club has put out seven avalanche beacon checking stations. The Caribou-Targhee NF, Idaho State Parks, Idaho State Snowmobile Association, the Anderson Avalanche Project, Klim, and a number of local businesses have also been key supporters of these efforts.

Avalanche forecasts are a collaborative effort between forecasters and the riding public. You can help improve the forecast by submitting observations at www.mtavalanche.com. Simply telling us that it snowed more than we are reporting or letting us know that winds are blowing hard and resulting in large drifts is very helpful. You could say, "We rode around all day with good visibility and didn't see any avalanches," or "We were riding and triggered an avalanche."

Your observations, both simple and complex, will help us provide lifesaving information to the community.

If you're going riding near Island Park, check www.mtavalanche.com/island-park for the most up to date snowpack, weather and avalanche conditions. Avalanche forecasts are published by 7:30 AM each morning during the winter recreation season.



MONTANA SNOWMOBILE PROGRAM UPDATE

Snow totals for December so far have been minimal around the state. I have asked clubs not to groom until there is snow throughout the trail system. When the clubs run their groomers on little to no snow, it causes expensive repairs to the equipment. Repair funds for the 26 state-owned groomers are minimal. There is a possibility that a club will not be able to get the funding to repair their groomers from the early season breakdowns, and the trails may not be groomed all year. As snowmobilers, please be mindful of the trail conditions due to the low snow totals this early season.

Missoula is in the process of receiving a Bison groomer from Prinoth this season. We've seen equipment costs increase with every year. New equipment manufacturers must meet tougher governmental emission standards which has raised the costs to us.

As the cost of new machines has increased, the availability of good quality, used groomers has shrunk. More and more owners are holding on to their equipment longer, which also raises the cost of replacement. Please inform others to purchase a trail pass. All the revenues from the trail pass go directly to grooming grants and equipment.

Please find an avalanche class to take this December or January. Your life or those you ride with may depend on it. There are many classes being offered all over the state by snowmobile clubs and avalanche centers. Make the effort to practice using your transceivers as a group. Most of the people we lost in avalanches last year had avalanche gear on, but those they rode with did not know how to use it. Make sure you know the avalanche conditions where you are riding. These can change daily.

Montana Trail Pass Snowmobiles operating on public land must be registered and display decals placed in a conspicuous space on the left side of the cowling. Registration is different for Montana residents and nonresidents. Montana FWP maintains a complete site with all the rules and regulations.

Anyone recreating on Montana State lands (State Forest) must purchase a Conservation License for all persons 12 or older. Each person must have their own License.
