### ELECTRIC UTILITIES SUPPORT CLUB TRAINING!

For the last few years the Flathead Snowmobile Association and the Bitterroot Ridge Runners (BRR) have been providing their area with specialized Avalanche and Safety Training program scholarships funded via their local electric utilities.

In the Flathead, the Friends of the FSA (a 501c3) applies for and administers a grant and payments to those that take motorized avalanche safety training classes. They apply for the sum total of all tuition in all motorized classes. In the last three years, over \$10,000 has been paid out to students reimbursing them for the cost of all motorized avalanche safety training ranging from Intro to Motorized Avalanche Safety all the way through Level 1 and Level 2 training. One cool note: a few people received the reimbursement and gave it back to the FFSA to pay it forward-thank you to them for making more training possible!

In the Bitterroot, the BRR has received two grants to do a variety of training. Last year, they received a \$2500 grant to fund 13 members getting Level 1 Avalanche Training. This year, they received a \$1200 grant in which 13 members received backcountry first aid and CPR training. Way to go BRR!

Other Co-ops and utilities in the state (Beartooth, Sun River, Hill County Electric, Vigilante and Yellowstone Valley) also offer similar programs! We encourage your club to seek them out! We also encourage you to write a letter to your utility if they don't offer a similar program–in some cases, it might not be possible, but most co-ops should be allowed.

Tips: Contact the administrator of the plan and find out how often they review applications and if there are sessions that are less busy than others–apply in the slower times to maximize your chances of funding. Also make yourself aware of the timeframe the money must be used in–give yourself time to use the money (usually, it's 3-6 month time period). Work with your local Avalanche Center (if you have one) to get the cost of the classes and how many openings there will be. You can also work with a trainer to create and schedule your own training class and have that underwritten by a similar program. You might not get all the openings funded. Seek out other sources like FWP's Snowmobile Program–Seth McArthur may have training funds available to supplement your needs.

None of this would be possible without the support of each Co-op and its customers who round up their bill to the nearest dollar each month. For that, we want to say a big thank you! We'd also like to encourage everyone to take part in their local utilities' RoundUp program like this. You round up your bill to the nearest dollar, usually costing you less than \$10 a year-those few cents all add up and quite possibly, you might just save a life. Again, thank you Flathead and Ravalli Electric Co-ops!!!


### Did You Know?

#### New Economic Impact Study Currently in Progress



# Watching for Red Flags

Reading the daily avalanche forecast is the best way to prepare yourself for the snow conditions you'll encounter when you head into the mountains. Check out the map at avalanche.org to find your local forecast. Avalanche forecasters work hard to collect weather and snowpack information and distill it into an easy-to-read forecast that will identify the day's potential avalanche hazards. Take advantage of that resource and set yourself up for success.

Once you're out there, you also need to stay alert and watch for warning signs that the snow is ready to avalanche. Make a plan before you head out, but be ready to back off if needed. Listen to what the mountains are telling you. Watching for "Red Flags" is one tool that can help.

Remember that not seeing these "red flag" signs of instability doesn't mean the snowpack is safe. But if you watch for these signs and back if you see them, you'll avoid many of the most clearly unstable situations.



#### - Recent Avalanches

Seeing avalanches that broke within the past 48 hours is the clearest sign that triggering another slide is possible. If avalanches are breaking on their own, or you see someone trigger an avalanche, the odds point towards more of the same. If you see recent avalanches, avoid steep slopes for the day.

#### - Collapsing or Cracking

If you feel the snowpack collapse under you, hear a "whumpfing" sound, or see cracks shooting out far into front of you – this is a sign that the snowpack is very unstable. You almost just made an avalanche, but weren't on a steep enough slope for it to slide downhill. If you see these signs of instability, stay off slopes steeper than 30 degrees. If you don't, you're likely going to trigger a slide.

#### - Heavy Snowfall

New snow adds weight to the snowpack. The more weight that's added and the faster it's added, the more likely the snowpack will reach its breaking point. Be alert whenever it snows, but a foot of new snow in the past 24 hours definitely means you are likely going to trigger slides.

#### - Wind Blown Snow

Wind drifting can load a slope really quickly often depositing snow 3 to 5 times faster than snow falling from the sky. Blowing snow and fresh drifts are indications of wind loading and increased avalanche concerns on wind loaded slopes.

#### - Rapid Melting

Water in the snowpack, whether from melting on sunny days or rain, makes for unstable conditions. Not all warmups cause avalanches, but be very suspicious anytime the snowpack is wet. If you're sinking in past your ankles in wet snow, it's time to avoid steep slopes or find a shadier slope.
