Support MSA 'Winter Wonderland' Specialty Plates! The legislature is in full gear now, fortunately, snowmobiling has not been under attack so far. We have had some bills correcting issues from previous bills that have popped up in the last few years.

The first one was HB99 which did not include snow bikes, fat tire bikes, and dog sleds to be included under the winter trail pass. This required a change from the term snowmobile trail pass to winter trail pass.

Second was a bill that did not allow any data collected by the Montana state government to be used by outside entities, we are requesting a change to include access by universities to be used for research purposes. We are in dire need of a new economic impact statement since our last one was completed In 2014. The economic impact studies are important as much of our funding is based on the number.

SHARE AVALANCHE AND SNOWPACK INFORMATION, SAVE LIVES

At avalanche centers, we travel around the backcountry to gather data about snow stability and avalanche danger in popular recreational areas. We want to know how the snowpack is layered throughout the backcountry, where weak layers exist and how much new snow or wind-drifted snow it might take to produce an avalanche. The snowpack and weather patterns can differ a lot across the large areas that avalanche centers cover. We cannot travel to all corners of the forecast area every day, so we use observations from the public to help us figure out where the snow is unstable. You can help your nearby avalanche centers by submitting observations through their websites, email, or social media.

After a day riding in the backcountry, donate 10-20 minutes of your time to share what you saw, especially if there were avalanches or if you triggered an avalanche. We often dig into the snowpack and do "snowpack tests" to find where the snow is unstable, as you may have seen in our videos and forecasts, but the most obvious sign that the snowpack is unstable is seeing recent avalanche activity or triggering avalanches. When we know about recent avalanches, we don't have to dig to look for instability. We are familiar with the difficulty of reporting avalanche involvements due to feeling embarrassed, but mistakes happen, and others can learn and live by knowing about recent avalanches. We will keep your identity anonymous if desired, and we can mention vague locations to keep top secret powder stashes safe.

You do not have to submit highly detailed or technical reports. Simple information can be the most useful. Share the estimated depth and width of avalanches, and the slope aspect and elevation where they occurred, if possible. If you are inclined to dig into the snow, we like to hear about how deep the snowpack is and how deep weak layers are buried, or if you notice a different amount of new snow than what we reported.

Many areas do not have an avalanche center, but nearby avalanche centers can facilitate sharing observations. Riders in areas without an avalanche center should consider sharing observations through social media networks, such as snowmobile club pages or a Facebook group that has members who ride in similar or nearby areas.

Letting other riders know about recent avalanches or unstable snow can help them plan to avoid potentially dangerous areas. Go to www.avalanche.org to find the nearest avalanche center to your riding area and share your observations. Each avalanche center has a place where you can submit observations to their website, email, social media or call and leave a message. You can also go to avalanche center websites to find recent avalanche activity and snowpack data for areas you plan to ride. This information can prevent accidents and save lives. Thank you for your support and sharing observations!



Montana Trail Pass and Registration

Resident Trail Pass

Snowmobiles operating on public land must be registered and display decals placed in a conspicuous space on the left side of the cowling. Registration is different for Montana residents and nonresidents. Montana FWP maintains a complete site with all the rules and regulations.

Resident Registration

Montana residents must register their snowmobiles at the County Treasurer's office in the county where the owner resides. This is a one-time registration and valid until the current owner sells the snowmobile.

DID YOU KNOW?

Following behind a groomer may not be the best idea. It can take 2 - 6 hours (or possibly more) for a trail to set up after a groomer has passed through depending upon the temperature and moisture content of the snow.

Trail setup can be similar to freezing a tray of ice cubes - after an hour you may have a crust on the surface of the ice cube but the center isn't frozen, so you have to wait a few more hours for the ice cube or the trail to fully freeze solid.

MONTANA LAW

In Montana, anyone 16 and under without a valid driver's license riding on a multi-purpose municipal roadway in Lincoln, Seeley, or West Yellowstone for example, is required to take a Montana-approved Snowmobile Safety Course and obtain a Snowmobile Safety Certificate. Riders under the age of 16 are also required to be under the direct supervision of a licensed adult. For more information, visit www.snowmobilecourse.com.



MSA RECOGNIZES REBRANDED SEELEY CLUB

Making a Difference, Seeley Lake Groups Unite

Seeley Lake Driftriders was formed in 1967. It supported outdoor recreation, primarily snowmobiling, in the Seeley Lake and Swan Valleys of Western Montana. In early 2021, the Seeley Lake Driftriders merged with Seeley Swan ATV Club and Seeley E-Bikers to foster a new vision for managed trail systems. This newly formed non-profit group is now recognized as Scenic Montana Trails (SMT).

Think of SMT as all things motorized/mechanized. By joining forces, we have a larger voice as we represent area interests with state and federal agencies that provide funding for trail development and control access to our public lands. Combining the three user groups into one provides a single organization to apply for funds and provide the manpower necessary to build and maintain trails for all mechanized sports.

If you're a snowmobiler, ATV/UTV/Dirt-biker, or Mountain/E-biker, we have you covered. We have 430 miles of groomed trails, countless miles of secondary trails, and great areas for off-trail riding, not to mention views that can restart your heart. In the winter months, we keep these trails groomed with three Piston Bully groomers using a mixture of pull-behind drags, mogul masters or a tiller. Each Groomer is equipped with a spot GPS tracking device and can be tracked online to maximize your day of riding. In the non-winter months, we use good old manual labor to keep the trails fun.

Scenic Montana Trails is the club that serves the needs and interests of everyone interested in outdoor recreation in the Seeley Lake area.


