Montana Snowmobile Trail Pass & Registration

Snowmobiles operating on public land must be registered and display decals placed in a conspicuous space on the left side of the cowling. Registration is different for Montana residents and nonresidents.

Residents must purchase a Winter Trail Pass to legally ride on any of the 4,000 miles of groomed snowmobile trails in Montana. Trail Passes are valid for two seasons and are \$20 per machine. Nonresidents are \$35 per machine.

Trail Passes are required for all dog sleds and "mechanized equipment" including snowmobiles, motorized snow bikes, and fat tire pedal bikes. Purchase your pass online or through a participating vendor.

Montana residents must register their snowmobiles at the County Treasurer's office in the county where the owner resides. This is a one-time registration and valid until the current owner sells the snowmobile.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE By Fred Bailey

Backcountry recreation provides therapy. From the MSA archives...

Recent catastrophes are weighing heavily on everyone's mind. The September 11 attacks changed our comfortable world forever, in ways we only now are beginning to understand. The official immediate reaction that shut down the country's air travel was necessary for security, and the follow-up that caused many to cancel travel was understandable. The economic fallout was horrendous.

It's very stressful to find our bearings as our world has changed forever. Yet we have a duty to carry on, for ourselves as well as for our country.

On September 25, I flew from Idaho Falls to Minneapolis. I wasn't sure what to expect, but the flight was routine and proceeded very comfortably, although it was strange to see the Minneapolis terminal nearly deserted when I arrived at 8:30 PM. That situation changed dramatically when I departed for home a few days later; a 40minute line cr. wled through the gate screening. I understand that now these kinks in the system are smoothing out.

We're carrying on with a heightened sense of patriotism. I am very encouraged to see flags flying everywhere. I am proud to see all the "United We Stand" and "In God We Trust" signs on commercial billboards throughout the country. We search for ways to contribute materially. Many are rediscovering the core values that I hold dear.

It is essential, not frivolous, to take time out during these troubled times to enjoy our favorite kind of backcountry recreation. We need to spend a few hours watching the landscape unfold before us as we travel through. We need to escape into the challenge of twists, turns, hills, rocks, and ledges. We need to smell the dry weeds and falling leaves of the season (gesundheit!). We need to fall asleep at night exhausted by physical exertion, our mind overwhelmed by the sensations of the outdoors.

We can return to the cares of the day renewed, recreated. I am pretty lucky that my husband, Jeff, insists that we get out on some trail somewhere on a weekly basis. If I protest that we must stay home and attend to chores, he can get pretty cranky. Chores can wait, but renewal of the spirit cannot. When I come back, I am so much more relaxed; stresses have bounced off with each rock in the trail. I am so much more productive as I resume life's tasks. As our burdens become greater, so is our need to take this time out.

One of our basic freedoms that we most insistently defend is the "freedom to recreate". We can't be restored or re-created if we don't have access and we don't have choices. You are aware that radical groups work very hard and spend millions of dollars to deny us this access and choice. They proselytize their recreation values and demonize ours. They use every means, legal, political, and media to force their values on everyone, denying us the freedom to



choose.

BlueRibbon's mission to promote recreation access and choice becomes even more important during these times of trouble and trial. We need your

support now more than ever. Additionally, your local club is the first line of defense in protecting your recreation close to home. Both BlueRibbon and your local club really do need help in protecting "freedom to recreate" – your recreation access and choice.

You also need to take a few hours and get out in the outdoors. Pursue your favorite activity and take your family with you. The challenges of the day

will not seem so large when you return. You can face our changed world renewed and re-created.

GRANT PROGRAMS



Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks is proud to administer 11 grant programs. These grant programs help provide funding for recreational opportunities – both motorized and non-motorized, habitat improvement, conservation efforts, educational opportunities, and more. **Visit fwp.mt.gov for more details**.

SNOWMOBILE PROGRAM

This state grant program supports snowmobile trail grooming, the purchase and repair of groomingrelated equipment, safety education, public outreach, and law enforcement.

This grant funding is available to snowmobiling clubs, organizations and public land-managing agencies.

Grants from this program finance the grooming of almost 4,000 miles of trails. Snowmobile grants are distributed through a peer-reviewed grant application process based on historic funding levels and other factors. FWP relies on its Snowmobile Advisory Committee to advise Montana State Parks on distribution of program funds and all matters related to snowmobiling.

To receive the full funds, club representatives must attend the Grooming Appropriations Meeting held annually and provide an update on their grooming season. Not attending the annual event can cause the club to lose 15% of the funding allocation for the grooming year. Attendance is considered part of the formal application process.

Initial funds are doled out based on needs, club activity, and groomed trail mileage to name a few of the elements factored in. The last quarter of the funds are released based on a formal web application through FWP and submission of supporting receipts resulting in a zero balance of grooming funds.

Recreational Trails Program

FWP administers the Recreational Trails Program (RTP), a federally funded grants program that supports Montana's trails. Approximately \$1.5 million is made available each year. **The FY2024 cycle is OPEN**. **Applications are due no later than January 15**.

TRAIL STEWARDSHIP PROGRAM

Funding for TSP comes from a portion of Montana's \$9 light vehicle registration fee, as well as a portion of marijuana tax revenue. Since its establishment TSP has awarded approximately \$3.6 million to 104 projects across the state focused on development, renovation and maintenance.


The 2024 grant application cycle will begin run from **November 1, 2023, through January 15.**

OFF- HIGHWAY VEHICLE PROGRAM

The Off-Highway Vehicle Grant Program provides project funding with the goal of enhancing and maintaining OHV recreational opportunities for the benefit of OHV enthusiasts in Montana. It provides grant funding for safety, ethics and education, resource maintenance, protection and improvement projects.

Montana State Parks administers the OHV grant program with funds appropriated by the State Legislature, and is assisted in grant allocation by the Off-Highway Vehicle Advisory Committee (OHVAC). The OHVAC is comprised of citizens throughout Montana who have a vested interest in managing OHV opportunities as a valuable resource. Both user groups and land management agencies are represented on the OHVAC. **The next application cycle runs November 15, 2023 through February 28, 2024**.

AVALANCHE SAFETY

Electronic Warfare

Jumping on our sleds and riding off in search of powder is a universal mission at trailheads throughout North America. While the enjoyment is undeniable, the risks are real. Weather, avalanches, breakdowns, crashes, and being thrown from the sled like a bronc rider are all things we accept. Many of us train and practice and push ourselves to be competent in the face of these hazards. We also spend hard-earned money on avalanche safety gear, notably an avalanche transceiver, shovel and probe. But there is a new hazard, unseen, and potentially life threatening: electronic interference with our transceiver.



Our sleds emit electronic noise, as do our phones, GPS trackers, radios, heated gloves, jackets and boots, smart watches, etc. All these devices can interfere with an avalanche transceiver, both as a victim and as a rescuer.

If you or someone in your party is buried, minutes matter. There is an 80% chance of survival if dug up in 12 minutes, which falls to 30% in 30 minutes. Electronic interference means that if you are buried and your phone or GPS tracker is close, your beeping signal will be compromised. If you are rescuer, being next to a running sled or having your phone close could give false depths and direction resulting in much longer search times. Saving a person completely buried in an avalanche is hard, stressful work that takes practice to perform quickly. We do not want to complicate this task any way.


Knowing the dangers of electronic interference is critical, and fortunately there are 3 easy steps you can take to minimize the consequence. **1. Turn off your sled before doing a beacon search.** If one is running nearby, you need to get 100 feet (30m) away from it.

2. Keep all your electronic devices 8 inches (20 cm) away from your beacon at all times. A phone in a breast pocket over your beacon is a no-no. So is wearing a heated jacket!

3. When you are doing a search, extend your arm out away from your body. 1 ½ feet (50cm) is sufficient distance for personal electronics to not interfere with your search.


Practice until you do these things automatically, and tell your partners about it too, since they are the ones who will dig you up and save your life.

All our devices make us safer and more comfortable in most circumstances, but not all. Being a serious rider demands attention to the details, and this new hazard is worth taking seriously.



TRANSCEIVER INTERFERENCE

Electronic devices, metal objects, and magnets of any kind will interfere with your transceiver's signal if they are too close.
