From Grassroots to Millions!

How the Trans-Montana Charity Ride is Rewriting the Future of Mental Health

Mother Nature may have sidelined our sleds this year, but she couldn't touch our mission.

Despite a lack of snow forcing the cancellation of the 2026 ride, the Trans-Montana spirit remained unbreakable. We didn't just "show up" at the MSA Annual Awards Banquet—we stormed it. With 25 of our 40 riders traveling from out of state and supporters arriving from every corner of Montana—from Eureka to Cooke City—we proved that this community is defined by its heart, not its horsepower.

The Power of the "Multiplier Effect"

We often ask ourselves: Is our \$33,000 annual average enough to move the needle? At the banquet, Matt Kuntz, Executive Director of NAMI Montana, gave us an answer that left the room silenced.

In the twelve years we've partnered with NAMI, we have raised over \$400,000. While we continue to search for corporate partners to grow that number, Matt revealed that our "small" donations are already performing miracles through what he calls the Multiplier Effect.

1. Transforming Veteran Care (The 800% Increase)

Our funds specifically target Veteran's Mental Health. In the past, federal funding for VA Peer Counselors (PCs) was based strictly on population, leaving Montana—a state with a massive veteran per-capita presence but low total population—with a budget for only two counselors.

Using the flexibility provided by our donations, Matt was able to lobby in Washington D.C. to change the federal allocation formula.

The Result: Montana's budget jumped from 2 counselors to 15. *

The Impact: We went from \$86,000 in annual federal support to over \$700,000 in real help for our veterans, every single year, forever.

The Bottom Line: Your donations helped turn 3,300 hours of counseling into nearly 25,000 hours. We are turning thousands of dollars into millions of dollars in value.

2. Saving Our Youth

Montana currently ranks #1 per capita in teen suicide—a statistic we refuse to accept. Our funds act as the safety net for Teen Suicide Prevention programs in at-risk schools. When state or federal funding falls short of the \$186,000 annual cost to run these programs, our money fills the gap. This coming year, we are also launching the Teen Mental Health First Aid program. This empowers Montana's youth to spot the warning signs in their friends and take life-saving action before it's too late.

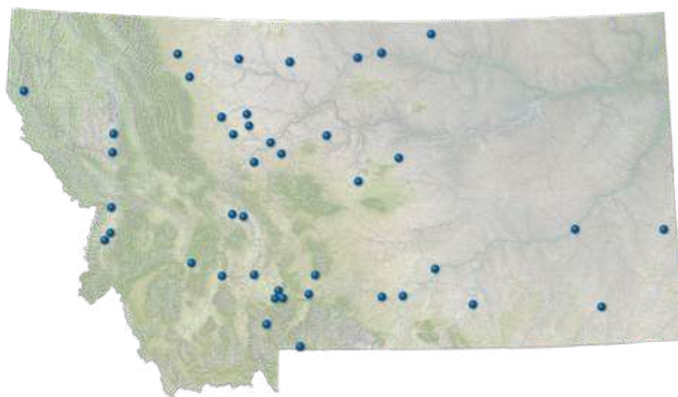
A Humble Thank You

To the riders who drove hundreds of miles just to sit at a banquet table, to the clubs who continue to hustle, and to the donors who trust us: Thank you. It is humbling to lead a group that "soldiers on" when the trails are bare. We aren't just a snowmobile group; we are a lifeline. The stats say there is more work to do, and as long as there is a need, we will be here.

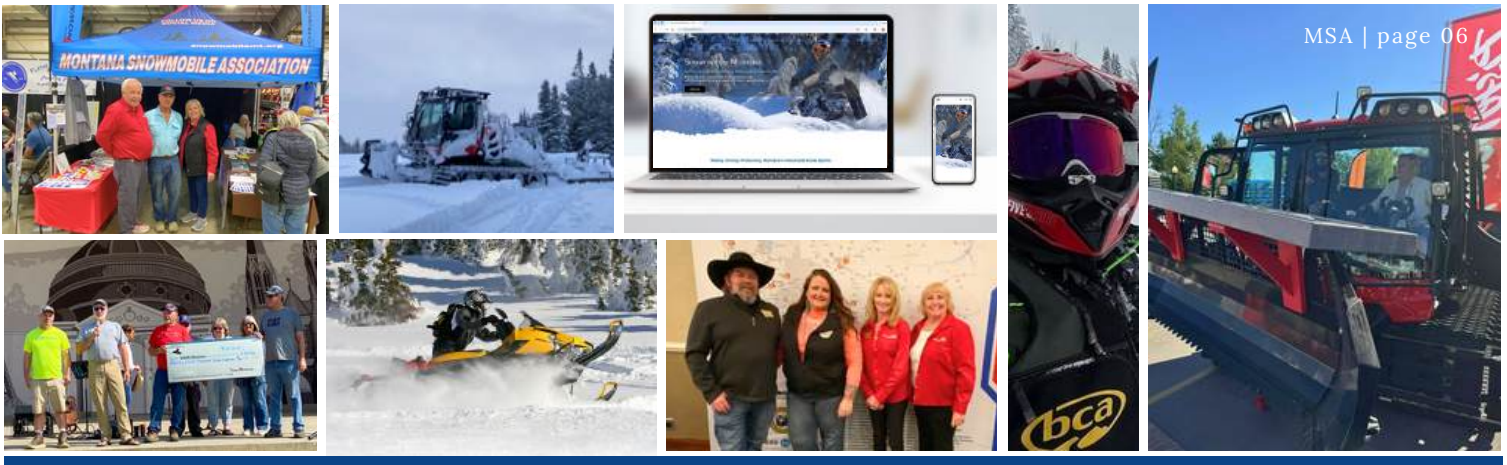

- Shared avalanche awareness resources and rider education materials.
- Promoted responsible riding and stewardship across the state.

We Refreshed Our Digital Presence

- Launched a newly refreshed MSA website with improved navigation and updated content.
- Made it easier for members to find events, newsletters, scholarship information, and association updates.
- Strengthened our online presence to better represent Montana snowmobilers statewide.

We Elevated Our Event Presence

- Invested in new event signage, tents, and displays to create a more professional and unified MSA presence.
- Improved visibility at rides, fundraisers, and public events.
- Strengthened brand recognition across districts and clubs.
- We Brought Riders Together
- Continued our charity auction efforts benefiting NAMI Montana.
- Hosted our Annual Awards Banquet celebrating Montana riders, volunteers, and clubs who go above and beyond.
- Recognized outstanding contributions that keep our snowmobiling community strong.

- Published monthly newsletters highlighting club activities, legislative updates, safety reminders, and member stories.
- Shared timely updates on trail conditions and event changes due to snowpack and weather conditions. (as reported by clubs)

- Awarded scholarships to support youth education.

Snowmobiles Return to the X Games (2026)

After a five-year hiatus, snowmobile competition roared back to the X Games Aspen 2026 in Aspen, Colorado.

The return featured two fan-favorite disciplines:

Snowmobile Freestyle

Riders launch massive tricks over freestyle ramps. Best run wins.

Snowmobile Speed & Style

Head-to-head racing mixed with freestyle tricks and style scoring.

This comeback was widely viewed as a nod to the sport's culture and fan demand.

Captured gold in Snowmobile Freestyle

Known for huge amplitude and signature tricks like the "California Roll"
